We are busting at the seams! This past year we have grown our family by seven! Not one, not two....SEVEN. We are almost at full capacity and we are feeling it. From needed increases in staff to lack of room in storage, having a full house has its challenges. More importantly, having a full house adds so much joy and a true difference in the world.

We have come to find that much of our home has needed improvements. A new playground set was warranted. Our last one gave us endless fun for 21 years, but it was apparent that the wear and tear had become too much. Our house has needed constant repairs over the last year as its age has caught up with us. New cabinet doors, light fixture replacements, new faucets and new floors are many of the things that

we have continued to work on over the years.

One thing that has never changed is our storage. Its capacity and capabilities has remained stagnant for the past 21 years. But, after seeing more than 50 kids walk through our doors and now with 14 currently in our home, the storage space has met its match. There is not an empty nook or cranny. It is important to know that because our kids have a more permanent home with us, we also act as a caregiver for many of their things. We keep baby pictures, childhood toys and other items that hold sentimental value until our kids are adults. We are the one constant in their life and if they have to leave us before they reach adulthood, we want to provide safe keeping for any items should they ask. When they go off to college, we may be their storage unit because they don't have any other family to care for their belongings. Our storage spaces are full and we need help adding a new storage shed.

So, the last 21 years has caught up to us, in more ways than one. This year has taught us the many blessings that we have and the amazing gift we can provide. It's been a crazy, busy year but in the end, we make it work. Volunteers step up to help out wherever is needed. Donors fulfill every need when asked. This year we realize, we are busting at the seams – but with love, smiles and happiness.

THERE IS ALWAYS ROOM FOR ONE MORE

There is nothing quite like the sounds of a full house. The giggles, the pitter patter of bare feet on the hardwood floors, and even the sound of little arguments and big feelings remind us of why we do what we do and why we believe that, when possible, there is always room for one more.

Whenever we receive an inquiry about adding a new child to our home, everyone knows that my first answer is always yes. Only when it is determined that we aren't the right home to meet the child's needs, or we simply do not have a bed available does the yes turn to no.

Many things factor into our decision to add more kids to our home, first and foremost is, do we have the room? We are licensed to provide a home for 16 kids – 8 boys and 8 girls. If we have room, are we the best fit for the child's individual needs or do they require a higher or different level of care? And lastly, and probably the most important consideration is the impact on our existing kids. Will the new kids fit seamlessly (after the growing pains) into our family without any negative impact?

Recently, we received a photo and application for a sibling group of five kids aged 2-10 that were in an emergency shelter and needing a long-term home and we were asked if we could help. The sadness and fear in their eyes was devastating as was the reason they needed a new home. We were so fortunate to have the space available for these kids who are some of the brightest, funniest, and most resilient kids I've met. So, we added a few more chairs around the dinner table and wash a few more loads of laundry every day, but watching the sadness and fear fade into laughter and joy reminds us why we love a full house.

A full house means more groceries, more staff, more tuition, higher utilities and so much more laundry. But, also more love, more laughter, more milestones, and more purpose. A full house means that we are doing everything we can to help the kids who need us most by fulfilling our mission of keeping brothers and sisters together.
